




The Completion Report Card: Most Colleges Receive a Failing Grade

GRADE	GRADUATION %	NUMBER
А	90-100%	43
В	80-89%	101
С	70-79%	165
D	60-69%	259
F	0-59%	1,132

The Educational Policy Institute evaluated the graduation rates of 1,669 colleges and universities. As author Neal Raisman, Ph.D., notes, "Most colleges grade students on an A to F scale with A being excellent or superior and F representing a failing grade."

Impact: The College Earnings Premium and Professional Mobility




 In 2013 the median annual earnings for full-time workers aged 25 to 32 were higher by \$17,000 for individuals with a Bachelor's Degree or higher compared to individuals with only a high school diploma

Rising Earnings Disparity Between Young Adults With and Without a College Degree

Impact: Lost Tuition to Universities

- The largest single school lost \$102,533,338, while the average school lost \$9,910,811
- Publicly assisted colleges and universities averaged a loss of \$13,267,214 due to attrition
- Private colleges and universities averaged a loss of \$8,331,593



IN TUITION REVENUE IS LOST TO ATTRITION EACH YEAR

Impact: Social Opportunity Cost

Individuals with college degrees are:

- 44% more likely to report health to be 'very good' or 'excellent' than those without degrees
- Significantly less likely to struggle with obesity or heavy drinking
- 3.6x less likely to have a disability that makes it difficult to live independently
- 4.9x less likely to spend time in jail or prison

The Forgotten Students: Debunking Common Myths

- Stopout students are typically weak students who struggle academically
- Students who leave school aren't interested in finishing their education
- Stopout students are primarily motivated to return to school for "extrinsic" reasons

Stopout Students: Why is bringing them back so difficult?

- **Locate**: Where are they?
- **Contact**: How do you get in touch with them?
- **Understand**: What circumstances led them to drop out? What would need to change for re-enrollment to become an option?
- **Guide**: What are the necessary steps for re-enrollment?
- **Support**: Who is acting as a support system for these students?

A New Approach to the Completion Crisis: Bringing the Forgotten Students Back

Don't treat stopout students as a single, monolithic group

One Profile, Three Personas



Blend humanity and technology

The Evolution of Engagement Channels

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Apply data and predictive analytics to the stopout population








A degree completion program, launched in the fall 2013 semester, that re-recruits stop outs who were close to finishing their first bachelor's degree








Finish Line Program Criteria

- Overall grade point average of 2.0






Results: 526 Graduates
