Chris Gilliard's work concentrates on privacy, institutional tech policy, digital redlining, and the re-inventions of discriminatory practices through data mining and algorithmic decision-making, especially as these apply to college students. He is currently developing a project that looks at how popular misunderstandings of mathematical concepts create illusions of fairness and objectivity in student analytics, predictive policing, and hiring practices.

Session Types

- ▶ Preconference Workshop: The preconference workshops are in-depth workshops that focus on an emerging issue or topic. Preregistration is required and workshops are free for WCET members and \$75 for non-members.
- Panel: A panel consists of a moderator and speakers presenting on a topic with audience O&A.
- Solo Presentation: Solo presentations spotlight edtech subject matter experts and innovators on a specific topic with time for audience O&A.
- Roundtable Discussion: One or two individuals act as the discussion leaders. They give a brief introduction of the topic or issue and then facilitate an informal discussion among the audience members. The topic can be controversial and/or have broad appeal that will elicit dialogue among the audience.
- ➤ EdTech Meet-up Demos: The practice and technology demos are tabletop displays and occur in conjunction with the morning and afternoon refreshment breaks and remain on display throughout one day of the conference.
